

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#### **About the Trust**

A guide for applicants: please note that these guidelines were revised in January 2001.

The Summerfield Charitable Trust was established by Ronald Summerfield, a Cheltenham antique dealer, shortly before his death in 1989. The Trustees have discretion as to which charitable uses to apply the funds. In 2002 £380,079 was distributed in a total of 75 grants, mostly between £500 and £5,000. A copy of the latest Trust accounts is available upon request.

Charities applying to the Trust must either be based in Gloucestershire or they must be engaged in a project that is of specific benefit to residents of the county.

Viewed especially favourably are:

- ✓ arts projects
- the needs of those living in rural areas;
- ventures which make a point of using volunteers (and which train volunteers):
- joint appeals from groups working in similar areas, who wish to develop a partnership; and
- those who are promoting excellence in a given field.

Preference is given to:

- applicants who show clear indications that they have assessed the impact of their projects upon the environment;
- schemes that indicate planning for long-term self-sufficiency;
- projects that demonstrate active involvement with the beneficiaries;

The Trustees prefer to award one-off grants to help fund specific projects, rather than to make payments for revenue items.

Individuals are only very rarely supported, students being more likely to

find favour than those with other needs. They must be residents of Gloucestershire. Trustees request individuals to use a specialist charity to sponsor their application.

#### Donations are *not* given to:

- organisations working outside Gloucestershire;
- medical research;
- private education; or
- $\overline{\mathbf{x}}$  animal welfare appeals.

**Procedure:** the Trustees meet quarterly, usually in January, April, July, and October to consider all applications received prior to the end of the preceding month. Applicants should write to me stating in their own words what is required and why.

**Please note** they must have filled in and returned a Grant Application Cover Sheet before the application can be submitted.

It helps if grant seekers say which other trusts they are approaching: we may consult them (or members of our informal panel of advisors) about any applications we receive, unless applicants specifically write to request us not to.

I aim to inform applicants of the Trustees' decisions as soon as possible after their meetings.

All new applications are acknowledged: stamped addressed envelopes are welcomed.

#### Introduction

uring 2002 the Summerfield Trust distributed £380,079 to a wide variety of good causes in Gloucestershire. There is a detailed analysis of the grants in this booklet, which highlights the varying sizes of the grants. We endeavour to concentrate our grants towards projects where we believe that we can make a real difference. An example of this is our grant of £75,000 to Cinderford Artspace towards the purchase and refurbishment of the old Mercury Newspaper building in Cinderford. Some of the trustees visited the building and were impressed by the vision and enthusiasm that lay behind the plans to establish a new arts centre for the Forest. The grant has enabled this exciting project to happen.

We continue to receive a wide variety of applications, particularly from arts organisations and community projects, and we try to assist projects throughout the county. However, we have noticed an increasing decline in the number of appeals we receive from charities working to improve the quality of life for the elderly and the homeless. For the past eleven years we have provided an annual bursary for a fine art student from the University of Gloucestershire to attend the British School in Rome. In return the students have donated a piece of their work to the Trust. I am pleased to report that these works of art are now on display in the offices of the Countryside Agency in Cheltenham. This winter, my co-trustee, Richard Wakeford, kindly hosted a party for the Trust advisers at the Agency in order that they could view our growing art collection.

I would like to thank Baroness Onora O'Neill for her challenging lecture at the Cheltenham Literature Festival during which she discussed the breakdown of trust in our society. The lecture was well attended and we were particularly pleased to hear some stimulating debate generated by some of the sixth-formers in the audience. We are greatly helped in our work by our team of volunteer advisers, our administrator, Lavinia Sidgwick, and by our secretary Tracey Price. They are always available with advice to help applicants through the process. We also do spot-check evaluations on grants which we have made in previous years to ensure that they have been properly and effectively utilised. This year we are encouraging people to read this report though our website, in order to save the costs of postage. I mentioned

the turbulent financial markets in this report last year and unfortunately they are no better. We proceed with caution, aware we may have to be less generous for a while. Finally I must thank Rachel Managhan, who retired as trustee after five years, for her commitment and enthusiasm. Jamila Gavin, an author and long-term resident of Stroud, has nobly stepped into her shoes. She has already shown the intelligence, and generosity with her time, which are the hallmarks of the other trustees. I am most grateful to them.

## 2002 GRANTS Summary

## **Arts & Museums**

Bream Silver Band £4,000

Bream Silver Band has been performing in the Forest of Dean since the early 1900s. SCT made a contribution towards the cost of replacing the Bandroom windows.

British Empire & Commonwealth Museum Trust £3.000

SCT awarded a grant to help schools within the Gloucestershire Education Achievement Zones visit this new museum in Bristol.

Cheltenham Arts Festivals Ltd. £10,000 SCT awarded the Jazz Festival £1,000 for Jazz It Up: taking jazz music into schools and giving students free tickets to events.

£4,000 for the Music Festival's Songs of India: a collaborative project with the Gloucestershire Academy of Music and Performing Arts running workshops led by professional Indian musicians for local junior schools.

The Literature Festival received £3,000 for creative-writing workshops for people who have long-term ill health or disability. The remaining £2,000 was for the Summerfield Lecture when Baroness Onora O'Neill discussed the question of trust in the public services.

Cinderford Artspace £55,000

Cinderford Artspace is a community arts resource for the Forest of Dean, established in 1988. SCT awarded a major grant, to be paid in two tranches, to enable Artspace to buy and refurbish premises in the centre of the town for a new arts centre.

Arts in Trust was set up by the East Gloucestershire NHS Trust to improve the interiors of its' hospitals and health centres. SCT made a donation towards the purchase of a collection of paintings by the hospital's artist in residence, John Whiskerd. (See photograph front cover).

## European Blues Association for Central Gloucester Initiative £2,000

SCT awarded a grant towards the costs of running the second International Blues & Heritage Festival held in Gloucester. (See photograph inside front cover).

## Everyman Theatre £30,000

The Everyman was given a major capital grant to upgrade the air conditioning in the auditorium.

#### Giffords Circus **£2,000**

Giffords Circus tours its' traditional arts and crafts acts to village greens and playing fields throughout Gloucestershire. SCT made a donation towards the cost of a professional P.A. system.

## Ledbury Poetry Festival £1,000

SCT gave a grant to enable Gloucestershire schools to participate in the Ledbury Poetry Festival in June 2002.

#### Newent & District Choral Society £1,000

The Society requested help with the costs of promoting live music performances in Newent and the surrounding area.

## Roses Theatre Trust £5,000

The theatre was awarded a grant to take performing arts workshops, designed specifically for elderly people, to residential homes and day care centres in the Tewkesbury area.

Ashcroft Church. Cirencester £2,500

This church in Circnester was raising funds to refurbish the community centre's kitchen facilities.

The Gloucestershire branch of Crimebeat was launched in 1998 to work with the county's young people to encourage them to make their communities safer. SCT donated towards its' capital fund for youth initiatives.

SCT made a grant to help to establish a volunteer-run community shop in Elim Church Centre in Gloucester.

Fairford Community Centre

£10,000

This Community Centre was raising funds to undertake a total refurbishment scheme.

Family Space In Hesters Way £5,000

SCT agreed a second grant towards the running costs of the Cheltenham Child Contact Centre based in Hesters Way.

Gloucester Child Contact Centre

In 2001 SCT agreed a three year grant to the Gloucester Child Contact Centre for running costs.

St. Michael's Cornerstone Trust £5,000 This Trust was rebuilding a church, which had been destroyed by arson, into a community centre for the residents of the Whaddon estate in Cheltenham.

## Conservation of the built & natural environment

Cheltenham Hebrew Congregation £5,000

SCT made a donation towards the restoration of the Grade II\* listed Cheltenham Synagogue.

Cotswold Canals Trust £3.000

SCT funded an environmental impact assessment study which had to be completed before restoration could start on 37 miles of Gloucestershire's inland waterways linking the River Severn to the Thames. (See photograph inside back cover).

Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust £5,000 This was the tenth annual grant to GHCT special fund, which is used to help churches needing money for projects other than structural repairs.

SCT contributed towards the refurbishment of this village hall near Stroud.

*Plantlife* **£4,000** 

Plantlife needed funds to set up a protection programme for the endangered Cotwold pennycress plant.

St Katherine's Church, Gloucester £280 SCT was asked to help with the costs of conserving the church banner of St. Katherine. (See photograph back cover).

St. James and All Saints Church, Gloucester £5,000 St. James Church is the parish church for Barton and Tredworth in Gloucester. The interior of the church was being refurbished to make it more accessible for community activities.

Wemyss Memorial Trust for Stanway Cricket Club £2,000 Stanway Cricket Club dates back to 1890. It is in parkland close to Stanway House, surrounded by ridge and furrow farmland. The Clubhouse, which was presented to the Club by the playwright Sir James Barrie in 1924, is a Grade II listed thatched building, sitting on Cotswold staddle stones. SCT made a donation towards the re-thatching.

Friends of Battledown Children's Centre, Cheltenham £4,000 This was the final tranche of a three-year grant for the salary of a Sensory Integration therapist.

Friends Of Bettridge School, Cheltenham £800 Bettridge School in Cheltenham caters for children aged between 2 and 16 with severe learning difficulties. SCT contributed towards the costs of a summer playscheme.

Gloucestershire Aids Trust £2,000 G.A.T requested a donation to supplement its' small grants scheme which offers support to clients in hardship.

Total Paid




Figure 2: GRANTS PAID - 5 YEAR PATTERN

Average Grant





Figure 3: GRANTS PAID - 5 YEAR PATTERN

Number of Grants






