

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2003 Grants

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About the Trust

The Summerfield Charitable Trust was established by Ronald Summerfield, a Cheltenham antique dealer, shortly before his death in 1989. The Trustees have discretion as to which charitable uses to apply the funds.

In 2003 £337,171 was distributed in a total of 77 grants, from £500 upwards. A copy of the latest Trust accounts is available upon request.

Charities applying to the Trust must either be based in Gloucestershire or they must be engaged in a project that is of specific benefit to residents of the county.

VIEWED ESPECIALLY FAVOURABLY ARE:

- ✓ arts projects
- the needs of those living in rural areas;
- ✓ ventures which make a point of using volunteers (and which train volunteers);
- ✓ joint appeals from groups working in similar areas, who wish to develop a partnership; and
- those who are promoting excellence in a given field.

PREFERENCE IS GIVEN TO:

- ✓ applicants who show clear indications that they have assessed the impact of their projects upon the environment;
- ✓ schemes that indicate planning for long-term self-sufficiency;
- ✓ projects that demonstrate active involvement with the beneficiaries;

The Trustees prefer to award one-off grants to help fund specific projects, rather than to make payments for revenue items.

Individuals are only very rarely supported, students being more likely to find favour than those with other needs. They must be residents of Gloucestershire.

Trustees request individuals to use a specialist charity to sponsor their application.

Donations are *not* given to:

- medical research;
- private education
- ✗ animal welfare appeals
- ✗ funding trips abroad

Procedure – The Trustees meet quarterly, usually in January, April, July, and October to consider all applications received prior to the deadline date (5th December, 5th March, 5th June and 5th September).

Applicants should write to me stating in their own words what is required and why. **Please note** a Grant Application Cover Sheet should be completed and returned before an application can be submitted. Applicants are welcome to telephone and discuss applications with me before submission.

It helps if grant seekers say which other trusts they are approaching: we may consult them (or members of our informal panel of advisers) about any applications we receive, unless applicants specifically write to request us not to.

I aim to inform applicants of the Trustees' decisions as soon as possible after their meetings.

All appropriate new applications are acknowledged: stamped addressed envelopes are welcomed. Please note we do not accept faxed or emailed applications.

Introduction

uring 2003 the Summerfield Trust distributed £337,171 to a wide variety of good causes. In line with our stated policy these grants were made exclusively to beneficiaries based in Gloucestershire. There is a detailed analysis of the grants in this booklet, which highlights the varying sizes of the grants.

During the year we paid the final tranche of our £75,000 grant to Cinderford Artspace. This has enabled them to refurbish and move into the old Mercury Newspaper building in Cinderford. As a result of the move they have developed a wide range of exciting arts activities, which has led to a significant increase in the number of new members.

For the second year we have made a grant to the Lumbs Educational Foundation, who interviews young people needing financial assistance to further their education. In the light of recent government proposals this service will be increasingly useful, and our grant enables Lumbs to help a larger number of Gloucestershire based students.

We were also pleased to support the salary costs of a Student Community Action Co-ordinator at the University of Gloucestershire. This will enable a proper link between those young people who wish to "volunteer" their time to help the disabled, elderly and disadvantaged within our communities.

Our overall level of grant giving reduced in 2003 from its level in the previous year, reflecting the decline in the value of our equity investments. In recent months there has been an improvement in stock markets and this will hopefully help us to return to higher levels of distribution.

The wide range of applicants creates a demanding level of understanding for the trustees, combined with the ability to decide on the relative merits of different projects in different fields. We have included a brief biography of each trustee, which shows the range of knowledge, and experience, which they bring to the task. The trustees are greatly helped by our team of volunteer advisers, our administrator, Lavinia Sidgwick, and by our secretary Tracey Price. They are always available with advice for applicants who wish to apply for a grant. We also do spot-check evaluations on grants which we have made in previous years to ensure that they have been properly and effectively utilised.

Finally I must thank Ro Kaye, who retired as trustee after six years, for her commitment and enthusiasm. She brought a real knowledge of educational needs to the Trust as well as lots of common sense. We welcomed Jan Urban-Smith, as a new trustee during the year. She has already shown the intelligence and generosity with her time, which are the hallmarks of the other trustees. I am most grateful to them.

The Trustees

CHARLES FISHER Charles Fisher went to school in Cheltenham, and then graduated from Oxford University. He has pursued a career in business and was Chairman & Chief Executive of Sharpe & Fisher plc from 1989 to 1999. He is currently Chairman of Mowlem plc, and a director of a number of other major companies. He was also the Chairman of Cheltenham Arts Festivals Ltd from 1990 to 1995. He became Chairman of the Trustees in 1999.

JAMILA GAVIN Born in India, Jamila Gavin has lived in Gloucestershire for over thirty years. First a piano scholar at Trinity College of Music, London, then in Paris, she finally joined the BBC and worked as P.A. Director for Music and Arts on Television. On moving to Gloucestershire she turned to writing children's books, and has since produced numerous stories and novels for the whole age range, as well as plays for the stage, radio and television. She was runner up for the Guardian Children's Fiction Award, has been shortlisted for numerous other awards, such as The Smarties Prize and the Carnegie Award, and was winner of the Whitbread Children's Book of the Year Award in 2000.

GILBERT GREENALL Gilbert Greenall served in the army after going to Sandhurst. He subsequently trained as a doctor and was Senior House Officer at Cheltenham General Hospital. Since 1979 he has specialised in humanitarian emergencies and post conflict recovery, and is a member of the United Nations Disaster Assessment & Co-ordination team. He has led missions in many countries in recent years, including East Timor, Kosovo, Mozambique and Albania. He has also worked for the European Union and the Department for International Development.

JAN URBAN-SMITH Jan Urban-Smith has lived and worked in Gloucestershire for the last 26 years. She has been an English teacher, Head of Sixth Form and Deputy Headteacher. She currently works as an adviser for the Local Education Authority.

RICHARD WAKEFORD Richard Wakeford lives in Winchcombe and is the chief executive of the Countryside Agency - the statutory body working for the environmental, economic and social well-being of the English countryside, its people and places. He worked previously in the Cabinet Office and in the Department of the Environment. He is a non-executive member of the management board of the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) and a member of the UK Sustainable Development Commission

2 Higher Ground £4,615	This new charity, based in Tewkesbury, offers support and career advice to carers of cancer sufferers. SCT gave a grant to help the charity and develop its service.
Forest Voluntary Action Forum (for Forest Fitness Centre) £10,000	The Forest Fitness Centre was established in 1991 in Cinderford, as a volunteer run, community based, exercise centre specialising in remedial programmes for the elderly and those with disabilities. To help meet demand, SCT awarded a grant towards the expansion of the Centre.
Friends of Amberley School £ 8,000	Amberley Ridge in Stroud is a school for primary age children with severe learning difficulties. This grant went towards rebuilding the swimming pool.

Total Paid




Figure 2 : GRANTS PAID - 5 YEAR PATTERN

Average Grant





Figure 3 : GRANTS PAID - 5 YEAR PATTERN
