About the Trust

The Summerfield Charitable Trust was established by Ronald Summerfield, a Cheltenham antique dealer, shortly before his death in 1989. The Trustees have discretion as to which charitable uses to apply the funds.

In 2007 £397,128 was distributed in a total of 79 grants, from £300 upwards. A copy of the latest Trust accounts is available upon request.

Charities applying to the Trust must either be based in Gloucestershire or they must be engaged in a project that is of specific benefit to residents of the county.

Viewed especially favourably are projects and organisations working in:

- \square The arts, museums and the built heritage;
- \square The environment and natural heritage;
- ☑ Community work;
- \blacksquare Education, sport and recreation;
- ☑ Vulnerable or disadvantaged sectors of society.

The Trustees encourage applicants to show they have considered:

- \square The impact of their project on the environment;
- \square Planning for long term self sufficiency;
- \square The potential to work in partnership with other statutory and non-statutory funders;
- \square Their active involvement with the people who will benefit.

Individuals are only very rarely supported. They must be residents of Gloucestershire. Trustees request individuals to use a specialist charity to sponsor their application.

Donations are <u>not</u> given to:

- Medical research;
- ☑ Private education;
- Animal welfare appeals;
- **E** Fund trips abroad;
- Projects that have already taken place.

PROCEDURE: The Trustees meet quarterly - usually in January, April, July, and October - to consider all applications received prior to the deadline dates. These dates are occasionally subject to change and should be verified via our website or by email / telephone before you submit your application.

TO APPLY: Applicants must read the website and download a grant application cover sheet. A concise explanation of the application (no more than one side of A4) should be sent to me by email. However, you must send a hard copy, which might have more detail, and any supporting documentation, to me at the address below.

Applicants are welcome to telephone and discuss queries with me before submission. Please note that I often ask one of our independent advisers to visit organisations who apply to the Trust. I aim to inform applicants of the Trustees' decisions as soon as possible after the quarterly meetings. All appropriate new applications are acknowledged: stamped addressed envelopes are welcomed.

Introduction

During 2007 the Summerfield Trust donated £397,128 to a wide variety of good causes. In line with our stated policy these grants were made exclusively to beneficiaries based in Gloucestershire. In this report there is an analysis of the grants, and this highlights the varying sizes of the grants.

We continue to encourage as diverse a range of applicants as possible, and we are keen to be involved in projects, both large and small, that are imaginative and to which we can make a significant contribution.

During this year we have made two grants larger than usual: £50,000 to Maggie Keswick Jencks Cancer Caring Centre towards establishing an innovative and exciting centre in Cheltenham for anyone whose lives have been affected by cancer. The building has been designed by Sir Richard MacCormac. We gave £25,000 to the Nelson House Trust to help them develop a new service for young people with drug or alcohol addiction problems.

The wide range of applicants creates a demanding level of understanding for the Trustees, combined with an ability to decide on the relative merits of different projects in different fields. They are greatly helped in this by our team of volunteer advisers, and our administrator, Lavinia Sidgwick. During the year we reviewed operations to identify ways in which we could improve our day-to-day activities. This has resulted in a number of changes, which, we hope, will help applicants.

Finally I would like to thank my co-trustees for the generous allocation of their time. They are all busy people with their own careers and yet they find the time to do this work with unfailing good humour. They help to make Gloucestershire a better place.

CHARLES FISHER

Charles Fisher went to school in Cheltenham, and then graduated from Oxford University. He has pursued a career in business and was Chairman & Chief Executive of Sharpe & Fisher plc from 1989 to 1999. He is currently Chairman of Bayshill Estates Ltd and of Country Homes and Gardens plc, and a director of a number of other major companies. He was also the Chairman of Cheltenham Arts Festivals Ltd from 1990 to 1995. He became Chairman of the Trustees in 1999.

JAMILA GAVIN

Born in India, Jamila Gavin has lived in Gloucestershire for over thirty years. First a piano scholar at Trinity College of Music, London, then in Paris, she finally joined the BBC and worked as P.A. Director for Music and Arts on Television. On moving to Gloucestershire she turned to writing children's books, and has since produced numerous stories and novels for the whole age range, as well as plays for the stage, radio and television. She was runner up for the Guardian Children's Fiction Award, has been shortlisted for numerous other awards, such as The Smarties Prize and the Carnegie Award, and was winner of the Whitbread Children's Book of the Year Award in 2000.

GILBERT GREENALL

Gilbert Greenall served in the army after going to Sandhurst. He subsequently trained as a doctor and was Senior House Officer at Cheltenham General Hospital. Since 1979 he has specialised in humanitarian emergencies and post conflict recovery, and is a member of the United Nations Disaster Assessment & Co-ordination team. He has led missions in many countries in recent years, including East Timor, Kosovo, Mozambique and Albania. He has also worked for the European Union and the Department for International Development.

JAN URBAN-SMITH

Jan Urban-Smith has lived and worked in Gloucestershire for the last 26 years. She has been an English teacher, Head of Sixth Form and Deputy Headteacher. She currently works as an adviser for the Local Education Authority.

IALL A grant to help re-wire the village hall.

Hester's Way Partnership in Cheltenham seeks to promote and assist the regeneration of Hesters Way, one of the most disadvantaged urban areas in the county. SCT gave a grant for the purchase of equipment for a new resource centre.

The African Community (AFCO) Society was founded to help improve integration amongst the black and minority ethnic communities who live in Cheltenham. SCT awarded a grant to help buy sports equipment for its junior sports club.

SCT agreed a grant to help build an extension to this playgroup in the Forest of Dean.

Grant given to this Bristol Museum to be used to train teachers from Gloucestershire schools and provide free visits for their pupils.

This was the third and final tranche of a grant agreed to CAF to employ an education development manager. The grant included the cost of the annual Summerfield Lecture which was given by Professor Anthony Grayling.

B To help install practice netting.

Fairford Playgroup is the only pre-school facility in the town and surrounding villages. In order to meet regulations it needed to extend the building.

SCT gave a donation to Glevum Knights, a youth marching brass band based in Gloucester, to help cover the costs of ten brass band workshops for schools and youth clubs.

This charity tours primary schools with a mobile classroom equipped to educate children in how to sustain a healthy lifestyle. A grant was given towards the purchase of a replacement mobile.

To help this Guides group buy a camping trailer.

GymNation is a charity which runs a community gym and a "Friendship Cafe", primarily for the black and minority ethnic communities of Gloucester, but no-one is excluded. SCT agreed a grant towards the co-ordinator's salary.



Figure 1: TOTAL GRANTS PAID – 9 year pattern






Figure 2: AVERAGE GRANT PAID – 9 year pattern
