# About the Trust

The Summerfield Charitable Trust was established by Ronald Summerfield, a Cheltenham antique dealer, shortly before his death in 1989. The Trustees have discretion as to which charitable uses to apply the funds.

In 2008 £367,297 was distributed in a total of 70 grants, from £300 upwards. A copy of the latest Trust accounts is available upon request.

## Charities applying to the Trust must either be based in Gloucestershire or they must be engaged in a project that is of specific benefit to residents of the county.

#### Viewed especially favourably are projects and organisations working in:

- $\square$  The arts, museums and the built heritage;
- $\square$  The environment and natural heritage;
- ☑ Community work;
- $\blacksquare$  Education, sport and recreation;
- ☑ Vulnerable or disadvantaged sectors of society.

#### The Trustees encourage applicants to show they have considered:

- $\square$  The impact of their project on the environment;
- $\square$  Planning for long term self sufficiency;
- $\square$  The potential to work in partnership with other statutory and non-statutory funders;
- $\square$  Their active involvement with the people who will benefit.

*Individuals are only very rarely supported.* They must be residents of Gloucestershire. Trustees request individuals to use a specialist charity to sponsor their application.

Charities which have been in receipt of a grant should not re-apply for at least two years unless they have specifically been asked to do so.

#### Donations are <u>not</u> given to:

- Medical research;
- Private education;
- Animal welfare appeals;
- $\mathbf{\mathbb{X}}$  Fund trips abroad;
- Projects that have already taken place.

**PROCEDURE:** The Trustees meet quarterly - usually in January, April, July, and October - to consider all applications received prior to the deadline dates. These dates are occasionally subject to change and should be verified via our website or by email / telephone before you submit your application.

**TO APPLY:** Applicants must read the website and download a grant application cover sheet. A concise explanation of the application (no more than one side of A4) should be sent to me by email. However, you must send a hard copy, which might have more detail, and any supporting documentation, to me at the address below.

Applicants are welcome to telephone and discuss queries with me before submission. Please note that I often ask one of our independent advisers to visit organisations who apply to the Trust. I aim to inform applicants of the Trustees' decisions as soon as possible after the quarterly meetings. All appropriate new applications are acknowledged: stamped addressed envelopes are welcomed. **Contact:**

#### THE SUMMERFIELD CHARITABLE TRUST

## Introduction

During 2008 the Summerfield Trust donated £367,297 to a wide variety of good causes. In line with our stated policy these grants were made exclusively to beneficiaries based in Gloucestershire. In this report there is an analysis of the grants, and this highlights the varying sizes of the grants.

We continue to encourage as diverse a range of applicants as possible, and we are keen to be involved in projects, both large and small, that are imaginative and to which we can make a significant contribution.

During the year we conducted a review of our investment managers and following a series of interviews we moved the management of our investments to Smith & Williamson.

Along with markets in general our investments have dropped sharply in value, and at the year end were valued at £6,934,670 compared to £9,122,050 at the end of 2007. Investment income has remained at previous levels, but this may reduce in 2009, if some companies reduce their dividends, and if interest rates remain at current low levels.

2008 saw the opening of the refurbished Summerfield Gallery at the Pittville Campus of the University of Gloucestershire. This provides a light and modern exhibition space which was needed in Cheltenham. We were pleased that it was used in December for an exhibition of photographs by Sam Taylor-Wood in aid of Maggie's Centres, which is another charity we have supported.

We decided during the year that we would donate our collection of paintings from the Rome Scholars awards to the University of Gloucestershire. These paintings are now hanging in the Oxstalls campus in Gloucester.

The Art Gallery and Museum in Cheltenham have developed plans for a major expansion of its exhibition space, and improvement to its facilities, in conjunction with the Borough Council. The Art Gallery had close links with our founder, Ron Summerfield, and we decided as part of our 20<sup>th</sup> year since the creation of the Trust, to pledge £750,000 to this major development. Fortunately we placed this money in a cash deposit before the main downturn in markets.

The Trustees are greatly helped in assessing applications by our team of volunteer advisers. We held a useful seminar at the Pittville Pump Room and Brian Whittaker of the Llankelly Chase Charity came to give us his insights into the techniques needed for making assessments.

The wide range of applicants creates a demanding level of understanding for the Trustees, combined with an ability to decide on the relative merits of different projects in different fields. They are greatly helped in this by our team of volunteer advisers and our administrator, Lavinia Sidgwick.

Finally I would like to thank my co-trustees for the generous allocation of their time. They are all busy people with their own careers and yet they find the time to do this work with unfailing good humour. They help to make Gloucestershire a better place.

## About the Trustees

#### CHARLES FISHER

Charles Fisher went to school in Cheltenham, and then graduated from Oxford University. He has pursued a career in business and was Chairman & Chief Executive of Sharpe & Fisher plc from 1989 to 1999. He is currently Chairman of Loumin Estates Ltd and of Country Homes and Gardens plc, and a director of a number of other major companies. He was also the Chairman of Cheltenham Arts Festivals Ltd from 1990 to 1995. He became Chairman of the Trustees in 1999.

#### JAMILA GAVIN

Born in India, Jamila Gavin has lived in Gloucestershire for over thirty years. First a piano scholar at Trinity College of Music, London, then in Paris, she finally joined the BBC and worked as P.A. Director for Music and Arts on Television. On moving to Gloucestershire she turned to writing children's books, and has since produced numerous stories and novels for the whole age range, as well as plays for the stage, radio and television. She was runner up for the Guardian Children's Fiction Award, has been shortlisted for numerous other awards, such as The Smarties Prize and the Carnegie Award, and was winner of the Whitbread Children's Book of the Year Award in 2000.

#### GILBERT GREENALL

Gilbert Greenall served in the army after going to Sandhurst. He subsequently trained as a doctor and was Senior House Officer at Cheltenham General Hospital. Since 1979 he has specialised in humanitarian emergencies and post conflict recovery, and is a member of the United Nations Disaster Assessment & Co-ordination team. He has led missions in many countries in recent years, including East Timor, Kosovo, Mozambique and Albania. He has also worked for the European Union and the Department for International Development.

#### JAN URBAN-SMITH

Jan Urban-Smith has lived and worked in Gloucestershire for the last 30 years. She has been an English teacher, Head of Sixth Form and Deputy Headteacher. Currently she manages the Health and Well-being team for the county which is a partnership between NHS Gloucestershire and the County Council.




